



David S. Robinson, M.A., R.P.A., is a marine archaeologist and scientific diver at the University of Rhode Island's Graduate School of Oceanography (URI-GSO) and President & CEO of David S. Robinson & Associates, Inc. (DSRA), a Jamestown, Rhode Island-based submerged cultural resource management firm. David specializes in multi-disciplinary marine archaeological investigations of submerged shipwrecks, coastal infrastructure, and ancient cultural sites submerged by sea level rise, in hazardous and non-hazardous marine environments. He has over 27 years of experience in marine archaeology and submerged cultural resource management, and has worked extensively with federal and state agencies, Tribes, industry, and academia in the U.S. and abroad. David served as the principal investigator/project marine archaeologist on the Deepwater Wind Block Island Wind Farm

and Block Island Transmission System Projects, and is co-principal investigator on the multi-year "Submerged Paleocultural Landscapes Project" funded by the U.S. Department of the Interior's Bureau of Ocean Energy Management. The Paleocultural Landscapes Project is developing new research techniques and recommendations for "best practice" protocols for identifying and protecting ancient submerged cultural sites. David is an undergraduate alumnus of URI where he majored in anthropology and art. He holds a master's degree in anthropology/nautical archaeology from Texas A&M University, and is completing a Ph.D. in anthropology at the University of Connecticut, where his research is focused on exploring problems in marine spatial planning and expanding the concept of submerged cultural landscapes. David was an adjunct faculty member in the University of Connecticut's Maritime Studies and Study Abroad Programs from 2006-2009. He served as the first Maritime Heritage seat on the Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary's Advisory Council between 2008-2014. In 2014, he was part of a working group that assisted the Massachusetts Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs and Office of Coastal Zone Management in updating the cultural resources portion of the Massachusetts Ocean Management Plan. Last year, David was appointed to serve a three-year term (2017-2020) as a member of the Mashantucket Pequot Museum & Research Center's "Knowledge-Makers Program." He is also currently serving a four-year term (2017-2021) as the cultural resources representative on the U.S. Marine Protected Areas Program's Federal Advisory Committee. David has authored dozens of technical reports and is a frequent invited speaker at local, regional, national, international, and tribal institutions, agencies and conferences. David is a Scientific Diver member of the American Academy of Underwater Sciences, a full-member of the New York Archaeological Council, the Society for American Archaeology, and the Society for Historical Archaeology. He is a Life Member of the Massachusetts and Maine Archaeological Societies.
